Reflections...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Lent is the season when we challenged ourselves to strip down our lives and pay attention to the essentials. The Church in Her wisdom knows that we need to do this because we are prone to mistaking wants for needs. Just as important the Lenten season of preparation allows us to value the outrageous abundance which God places at our disposal. This is particularly apparent when we fully participate in the liturgies of the sacred triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Great Vigil and First Mass of Easter. Just like Her Lord the Church is stripped bare, the Cross becomes the central focus of the space and we finish it all in a splendid garden celebrating the empty tomb and the Resurrected Lord in our midst.

The great fifty days of Easter challenges us to focus on a different set of essentials. If Lent is about pruning back the desires which erode the energy of our lives, Easter is about embracing those things which give us life and meaning beyond the narrow confines of our limited experience. First of all Easter asks us to embrace the Risen Lord. Christ Jesus , the God/Man shows us the full nature of God, which is summed up in one outrageous and impossible word, Love. God in Christ Jesus is reconciling the world to its true purpose, living in God's love. The empty tomb not only represents the limitations of our experience in this life but beckons us to consider realities greater than ourselves, our souls and our bodies.

What makes the Resurrection so hard for us to fully embrace is that it puts God at the center, rather than ourselves. The Resurrection is an extension of the love poured out at the beginning of creation. It gives ultimate witness to the power of vulnerability, which God has always shown in dealing with us. By making us in God's image, male and female we are made, our Creator gave us freedom to make choices. The Father's desire was that we live lives of love, creativity, reason and harmony with each other and God. But we choose to misuse our freedom and make choices based on the limited knowledge of self and our experience. By putting ourselves in the place of God we segregate ourselves from full participation in God's love and live in disharmony with creation and each other.

St. John's Gospel, the one we read the most of during Easter, makes it abundantly clear that the Way, the Truth and the Life for all creation is to be found most perfectly in Jesus; for it is in Jesus that sin and death are overcome and the way is opened for eternal life. Throughout Easter the Church gives us opportunities to encounter the resurrected Christ, through the power of the Holy Spirit. Because the Holy Spirit is able to use all sorts and kinds of encounters the season is rich with an abundance of images, stories and opportunities for festal celebration. Each experience of the resurrection has within itself an opportunity to become vulnerable and embrace the empty tomb, thereby living into the possibilities of the Resurrection. The challenge is and has always been to live into this truth in ways that are not sectarian but acknowledges the universality of God's reconciliation of creation. This does not mean abandoning the radical particularity of God in Christ Jesus in order not to offend those of other faith traditions. It does mean living more openly and vulnerably so that God may use us as a proclamation of Love and through that love bring people into the Resurrected Life.

This great Fifty Days of Easter join me in learning the grammar of vulnerability that we may surrender to the grace of God's love. Let us challenge each other to embrace the life which only comes from knowing the crucified Lord of Life. That we might move beyond the narrow confines of our imaginings, and catch a glimpse of the limitless world of the Kingdom of God. Together as a Body which has died and risen again in the waters of Baptism we can live lives more in harmony with the desire of God, who is Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
